ON THE BALLOT

Use HOPE's sample ballot to stay informed about who and what to expect when you go to vote.

STRAIGHT PARTY

This is the last election where voters in El Paso County will have the option of voting Straight Party. By selecting one of these three options, the voter's ballot will be cast in favor of all candidates who are running as members of a political party. Since El Paso City Council seats are non-partisan, they do not apply to straight party voting. You do not have to select straight party voting and can elect to vote on each race individually.

US SENATE

The United States Senate is the upper chamber of the legislature of the United States. The Senate is comprised of two senators that represent the entire state for staggered six-year terms. There are 100 members of the senate - two from each of the 50 states.

US HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The House of Representatives is the lower chamber of the legislature of the United States. The house is made up of representatives in congressional districts allocated to each state based on the results of the U.S. Census.

TEXAS STATE OFFICIALS

GOVERNOR

The Governor of Texas is the chief executive of the state. The governor makes policy recommendations that lawmakers from the Texas Senate and Texas House of Representatives use as they develop bills. The governor serves a four-year term and signs or vetoes bills passe by the Texas Legislature.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Texas Lieutenant Governor is the second-highest position in the executive branch and oversees the work of the Texas State Senate for a four-year term. The Lieutenant Governor controls the budgeting process for the state and determines committee appointments.

COMPTROLLER

The Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts is the chief steward of the state's finances acting as tax collector, chief accountant, chief revenue estimator and chief treasurer for all of state government. The Comptroller collects taxes due to the state and also manages and awards statewide contracts for services.

COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE

The Commissioner of the General Land Office manages land and mineral rights properties owned by the state. The General Land Office also manages and contributes to the Permanent School Fund, a wealth fund whose revenues fund Texas public schools.

AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER

The Agriculture Commissioner promotes production agriculture, consumer protection, economic development and healthy living. The agriculture commissioner oversees the agency and is elected every four years.

FYI: WHAT DO I NEED TO VOTE?

Texas law requires that voters show one of seven photo ID's when they vote.

These forms of identification include:

- Texas Driver License issued by Texas Department of Public Safety
- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety
- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by Texas Department of Public Safety
- Texas Handgun License issued by Texas Department of Public Safety
- United States Military Identification Card with the voter's photograph
- United States Citizenship Certificate with the voter's photograph
- United States Passport







SUPREME COURT OF TEXAS

The Supreme Court of Texas is the court of last resort for civil matters in the state. The Court is composed of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices. Supreme Court justices are elected to staggered six-year terms in statewide elections.

TEXAS COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals is the court of last resort for criminal matters. The Court is composed of a Presiding Judge and eight judges (unlike the Texas Supreme Court which is composed of a Chief Justice and eight Justices). Each judge serves a six-year term and they are elected in staggered partisan elections.

EL PASO COUNTY DISTRICT JUDGE

El Paso County has 13 district courts, each with a single judge, elected to a four-year term. District courts have original jurisdiction in all felony criminal cases, divorce cases, land title disputes, election contests, civil matters in which at least \$200 is disputed or claimed in damages, as well as other matters.

EL PASO COUNTY PROBATE COURT

The El Paso County Probate Court is responsible with determining how the estate of a deceased person gets settled through the courts. The purpose of the court is to prevent fraud after someone's death.

CITY OF EL PASO CHARTER AMENDMENTS

A charter amendment is a request to modify the city charter, the legal document formalizing the creation of a city.

City of El Paso Charter Amendment Proposition A

"Should Section 3.2 of the City Charter, Relating to the salaries of the mayor and district representatives, be amended to provide that beginning September 1, 2019, the annual salary of the district representatives shall be set each year at the amount equal to the El Paso County area median household income as established by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development or successor agency for the prior fiscal year, and the annual salary of the mayor shall be set each year at one and one-half that amount?"

For: 289 Against: 290

Amendment A asks voters if they are for or against an increase to the salary currently paid to city representatives. They currently make \$29,000 annually and this change to the city charter would increase their salary to \$45,300. This rate equals the 2017 El Paso County area median household income as established by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.







EL PASO CITY COUNCIL

The El Paso City Council is the main legislative body for the city. Each council member represents one of eight geographic districts with a mayor elected at-large. The council adopts the city budget, levies taxes, and makes/amends city laws. They work in close collaboration with the city manager.

FYI: WHO CAN VOTE?

To be eligible to vote in Texas , a person must be:

- Registered to vote
- A United States citizen
- A resident of the Texas county in which application for registration is made
- At least 18 years old on Election Day;
- Not finally convicted of a felony, or, if so convicted must have (1) fully discharged the sentence, including any term of incarceration, parole, or supervision, or completed a period of probation ordered by any court; or (2) been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disa bility to vote; and
- Not determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be (1) totally mentally incapacitated; or (2) partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote.







EL PASO COUNTY JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

El Paso County Justices of the Peace presides over the justice court in cases involving misdemeanors, small civil disputes, landlord/tenant disputes and more. They also conduct inquests and may perform marriage ceremonies.
